Greetings fellow members,

I write this Newsletter to keep you posted with news and info relevant to our club covering its administration, history, projects, functions, etc. The board has approved the newsletter in an endeavour to improve member awareness on club activities throughout the year on a quarterly basis. The source of news items will be the outcomes from board meetings, input from you, the member and gossip from around Perisher and National Parks.

Plans have been underway for some time to renovate the bathrooms and the end result will be recladding of the walls, frosted glass privacy partitions, under floor heating, new toilets and hand basins, the window at the basins will be able to be opened to assist in ventilation, provision of better sound insulation between R7 and ladies bathroom, new tiling throughout. The lodge will be off limits from February 2014 during the period of works. There will be a special working bee to gut the existing features and volunteers will be needed to assist here. The lounge window (west side) will also be replaced which has been suffering from a faulty seal for some time.

The last working bee also saw the construction of a garbage storage facility at the front entry to the lodge and this provides an animal proof storage for the bags awaiting pickup service. There are some teething problems with the lid but that will be fixed/ready for the main winter season. The next working bee is set for late October/November. More details on that in the spring newsletter.

There are plenty of opportunities for accommodation available in the coming months so check on the web site for these times and book your holiday.

From the last meeting a \$100.00 donation to the Nordic Shelter was approved. The club has supported this shelter for many years now in helping out with its operating and maintenance costs. NPWS advised the lodge now has a formal locational address and that is 69 Porcupine Place, Perisher Valley.

Long serving club member Kevin Hoffman has put together a précis of a designed format of 'The History of Shortland Alpine Club and Mulubinba Lodge'. The E-document is attached to this newsletter for your perusal and options for input. It is important for us all to assist on this project as time is against us for obvious reasons.

E-documenting of the

HISTORY of the SHORTLAND ALPINE CLUB CO-OP LTD and MULUBINBA LODGE.

The Board has agreed on 30 May 2013, that we try to do the history on-line. In discussion amongst the Board members we realised that memories and opinions vary in regard to what went on at different times. The concept of the club is now over 40 years old, it started formally in the 1970's, but the genesis had a pre-history in the 1960's. Some original members have passed on, some current members have grown up in the club from childhood.

The volunteering of work and effort by the members has made the club what it is today. The Board wants members to have a role in writing the history, if they want. Making it a "living history" on-line will allow members to contribute text and photos and other documents they may have.

Producing the history on-line means we can add new material in the appropriate Chapter at any time it is received. Being on-line means members and others can read it as it grows. The conventional way of writing a history is that an "author" has to do a lot of research over a long period, and then produce a text. Already it has been years since the idea of a history was first thought of by previous Boards, and the demands of time and collection of material have defeated any result.

From previous efforts the Board does have a few boxes of documents that can form the start of the history. But it is realised that just producing a chronological list of facts and events cannot tell the whole story. Contributions by the members can add the richness and texture of a tapestry to the chronicle.

The format starts here. Kevin Hoffman has re-joined the Board after a near 30 year break. He will be Editor for the time being, so you need to send your text/information and digital photos to him at hoffmandesign.planning@iinet.net.au.

You need to accept that the Board will approve (or not) each addition to the history, and it may be edited.

For instance some people may send documents about the same event. Those documents may be edited and melded in the interest of making the history fluent and readable. Where differences of opinion about the same event occur, the Board may be happy to include all or some of them because it will add varying perspectives. The Board must have the copyright of the history, so contributors have to accept they surrender any claim of copyright to the Board when they submit material.

The first instalment is a List of Chapters as set out below.

This List is only a draft adopted by the Board recently.

All members are encouraged to comment on the List, or suggest extra chapters, or even different names for the same chapter if it makes it more relevant.

We can easily add new chapters at any time in the future if the need arises!!!
